In the Year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Ninety-six.

AN ACT

Making Appropriations for Expenses authorized by the Present Legislature and for Certain Other Expenses authorized by Law.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The sums hereinafter mentioned
2 are appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury
3 of the Commonwealth from the ordinary revenue,
4 for the purposes specified in certain acts and re-
5 solves of the present year, and for certain other
6 expenses authorized by law, to wit: —

7 For compensation and expenses of the state
8 ballot law commission, as authorized by chapter
9 three hundred and eighty-three of the acts of the
10 present year, a sum not exceeding five hundred
11 dollars, the same to be in addition to the amounts
12 appropriated by chapter forty-two of the acts of
13 the present year.

14 For scholarships at the Worcester polytechnic

15 institute, as authorized by chapter four hundred
16 and seven of the acts of the present year, the
17 sum of three thousand dollars.

18 For clerical assistance, travelling expenses and
19 other necessary expenses of the state pension
20 agent, a sum not exceeding five hundred dollars,
21 the same to be in addition to the amount appro-
22 priated for the same purpose by chapter thirty-
23 four of the acts of the present year.

24 For expenses in connection with the preparation
25 and publication of a second supplement to the
26 Public Statutes, as authorized by chapter three
27 hundred and sixty-three of the acts of the year
28 eighteen hundred and ninety-five, a sum not ex-
29 ceeding ten thousand dollars, the same to be in
30 addition to the five thousand dollars appropriated
31 by chapter four hundred and seventy-three of the
32 acts of the year eighteen hundred and ninety-five.

33 For expenses in connection with a plan for
34 carrying into execution the recommendations of
35 the state board of education relative to school
36 attendance and truancy, as authorized by chapter
37 ninety-six of the resolves of the present year, a
38 sum not exceeding five hundred dollars.

39 For the construction of a new hospital building
40 for the Massachusetts charitable eye and ear
41 infirmary, as authorized by chapter ninety-seven
42 of the resolves of the present year, a sum not
43 exceeding fifty thousand dollars.

44 For certain repairs and improvements and for
45 the purchase of land at the Massachusetts agri-
46 cultural college, as authorized by chapter ninety-

47 eight of the resolves of the present year, a sum not
48 exceeding thirteen thousand nine hundred dollars.

49 For publishing a report of the public exercises
50 commemorative of Frederic T. Greenhalge, late
51 governor of the Commonwealth, as authorized by
52 chapter ninety-nine of the resolves of the present
53 year, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

54 For the further improvement of the Common-
55 wealth flats at South Boston, as authorized by
56 chapter four hundred and forty-two of the acts
57 of the present year, a sum not exceeding fifty
58 thousand dollars.

59 For expenses in connection with the protection
60 of the public health in the valleys of the Concord
61 and Sudbury rivers, as authorized by chapter four
62 hundred and forty-six of the acts of the present
63 year, a sum not exceeding three thousand dollars,
64 the same to be in addition to the unexpended
65 balance of the sum appropriated under chapter
66 four hundred and ninety-two of the acts of the
67 year eighteen hundred and ninety-four.

68 For the payment of expenses in connection with
69 the establishment of the boundary lines between
70 the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and the
71 states of New Hampshire and Vermont, as author-
72 ized by chapter one hundred and two of the re-
73 solves of the present year, a sum not exceeding
74 five thousand dollars.

75 For Elijah Smith of Easton, as authorized by
76 chapter one hundred and three of the resolves of
77 the present year, the sum of one hundred dollars.

78 For John H. Lamson, as authorized by chapter

79 one hundred and four of the resolves of the pres-
80 ent year, the sum of one hundred and thirty-five
81 dollars.

82 For James N. Tolman, as authorized by chapter
83 one hundred and five of the resolves of the pres-
84 ent year, the sum of six hundred dollars, payable
85 to him monthly out of the treasury of the Com-
86 monwealth, and, in case of his death, the same
87 sum per month to his widow.

88 For Ellis R. Holbrook, as authorized by chapter
89 one hundred and six of the resolves of the pres-
90 ent year, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five
91 dollars.

92 For necessary expenses, including postage,
93 stationery and other expenses, of the state mil-
94 itary and naval historian, a sum not exceeding
95 two hundred dollars, the same to be in addition
96 to the amount authorized by chapter eighty-eight
97 of the acts of the present year.

98 For expenses of summoning witnesses before
99 committees of the present legislature, and for
100 fees of such witnesses, a sum not exceeding two
101 hundred dollars, the same to be in addition to
102 the amount appropriated by chapter one of the
103 acts of the present year.

104 For authorized expenses of committees of the
105 present legislature, to include clerical assistance,
106 stenographers and counsel fees to committees
107 authorized to employ the same, a sum not exceed-
108 ing fifteen thousand dollars, the same to be in
109 addition to the amount appropriated by chapter
110 one of the acts of the present year.

111 For William Gibbons, as authorized by chapter
112 one hundred and seven of the resolves of the
113 present year, the sum of one hundred and twenty-
114 five dollars.

115 For Sylvester W. Russell, as authorized by
116 chapter one hundred and eight of the resolves
117 of the present year, the sum of one hundred
118 dollars.

119 For Olive A. Churchill, widow of S. Sylvester
120 Churchill, as authorized by chapter one hundred
121 and nine of the resolves of the present year, the
122 sum of one hundred dollars.

123 For Giles R. Alexander, as authorized by
124 chapter one hundred and ten of the resolves of
125 the present year, the sum of one hundred and
126 sixty dollars.

127 For the expenses of a commission to inquire
128 into the expediency of revising and amending the
129 laws of the Commonwealth relating to taxation,
130 as authorized by chapter one hundred and eleven
131 of the resolves of the present year, a sum not
132 exceeding five thousand dollars.

133 For expenses in connection with the prepara-
134 tion of the schedule of forms of pleadings in
135 criminal cases, as authorized by chapter one hun-
136 dred and thirteen of the resolves of the present
137 year, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

138 For the establishment of a fish hatchery in the
139 western part of the Commonwealth, as author-
140 ized by chapter one hundred and fourteen of the
141 resolves of the present year, a sum not exceeding
142 three thousand dollars.

143 For Charles W. Wilbur, the sum of one hun-
144 dred and sixty dollars; for Marcus Holmes, the
145 sum of one hundred and sixty dollars; for Free-
146 man Holmes, the sum of one hundred and sixty
147 dollars; for Charles E. Porcheron, the sum of
148 one hundred and sixty dollars; for Cornelius B.
149 Holmes, the sum of one hundred and sixty dol-
150 lars; for William Holmes, the sum of one hun-
151 dred and sixty dollars; for Preston Hooper, the
152 sum of one hundred and sixty dollars; for
153 Francis E. Allen, the sum of one hundred and
154 sixty dollars; for George F. Dunbar, the sum
155 of one hundred and sixty dollars; all of which is
156 authorized by chapter one hundred and fifteen
157 of the resolves of the present year.

158 For the payment of expenses to carry out the
159 act relative to the duties and authority of the
160 attorney-general, as provided for by chapter
161 four hundred and ninety of the acts of the
162 present year, a sum not exceeding thirty thou-
163 sand dollars.

164 To enable cities and towns to use the McTam-
165 many voting machines in state, city and town
166 elections, as authorized by chapter four hundred
167 and ninety-eight of the acts of the present year,
168 a sum not exceeding twelve thousand five hun-
169 dred dollars.

170 For Andrew J. Morton, as authorized by
171 chapter one hundred and sixteen of the resolves
172 of the present year, the sum of one thousand
173 dollars.

174 For Edwin A. Andrews, the sum of three

175 hundred and sixty dollars; for Elizabeth J. Bar-
176 ron, Bertha M. Armstrong, heirs at law of Henry
177 Barron, the sum of five hundred and forty-seven
178 dollars and fifty cents; for Eleanor Batchelder,

219 To provide for the purchase of additional
220 property for the Lyman school for boys, as
221 authorized by chapter one hundred and eighteen
222 of the resolves of the present year, a sum not
223 exceeding eighty-five hundred dollars.

224 To provide for placing in the state house a
225 bust of Samuel F. Smith, author of the hymn
226 "America," as authorized by chapter one hun-
227 dred and nineteen of the resolves of the present
228 year, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars.

229 For expenses in connection with aiding towns
230 in construction and maintenance of better roads,
231 as authorized by chapter five hundred and
232 thirteen of the acts of the present year, a sum
233 not exceeding twelve thousand dollars.

234 For Chester W. Green, the sum of one hun-
235 dred and twenty-five dollars; for Henry Howard,
236 the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars;
237 for John E. La Claire, the sum of one hundred
238 and twenty-five dollars; for Jason D. Wash-

239 burn, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five
240 dollars; for Peter Nolon, the sum of one hun-
241 dred and twenty-five dollars; for Leonard F.
242 Green, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five
243 dollars; for Hummington Porter, the sum of one

271 Marden, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five
272 dollars; for Nathan M. Walton, the sum of one

284 For Calvin Francis Harlow, the sum of one
285 hundred and twenty-five dollars, as authorized
286 by chapter one hundred and twenty-one of the
287 resolves of the present year.

288 To provide temporary accommodations for the
289 senate and its officers in that part of the recent
290 addition to the state house which is known as
291 the Bryant addition, as authorized by chapter
292 one hundred and twenty-four of the resolves of
293 the present year, a sum not exceeding ten thou-
294 sand dollars.

295 For the salaries and travelling expenses of
296 two additional associate justices of the superior
297 court, as authorized by an act of the present
298 year, a sum not exceeding four thousand dollars.

299 For salaries and expenses of the two additional
300 inspectors in the department of the district police,
301 to act as examiners of engineers, as provided for
302 in an act passed the present year entitled "An

303 act relative to the licensing of engineers and
304 firemen of stationary engines," a sum not ex-
305 ceeding twenty-five hundred dollars.

1 SECT. 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
